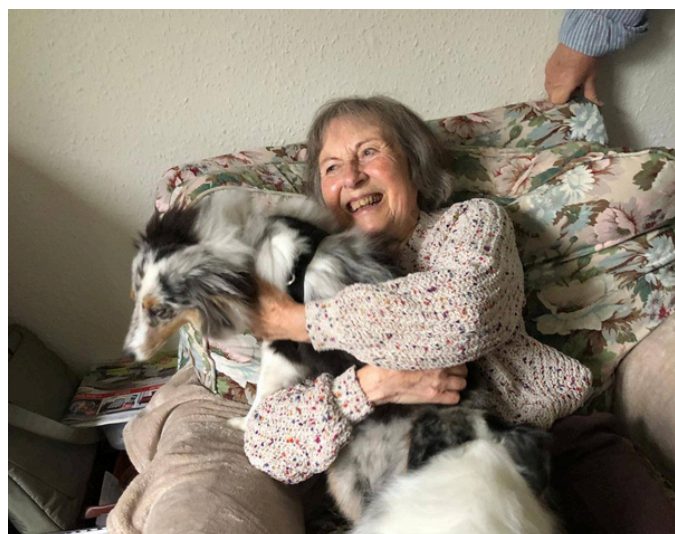

# Obituary - Dora Sendall

Dora Sendall (Sendora) sadly passed away in October 2025.

Dora's life was inseparable from her love of dogs, particularly Shetland Sheepdogs, which became her lifelong passion. From her early years in West Sussex, Dora immersed herself in grooming, showing, and breeding, guided by respected mentors and sustained by friendships that lasted decades within the dog world.

Her Sheltie journey truly began with Crunchie, a returned mongrel puppy from a litter she rescued from dire conditions. who quickly became her heart dog and the foundation of Dora's much-loved 'Chocolate' Sheltie cross line.

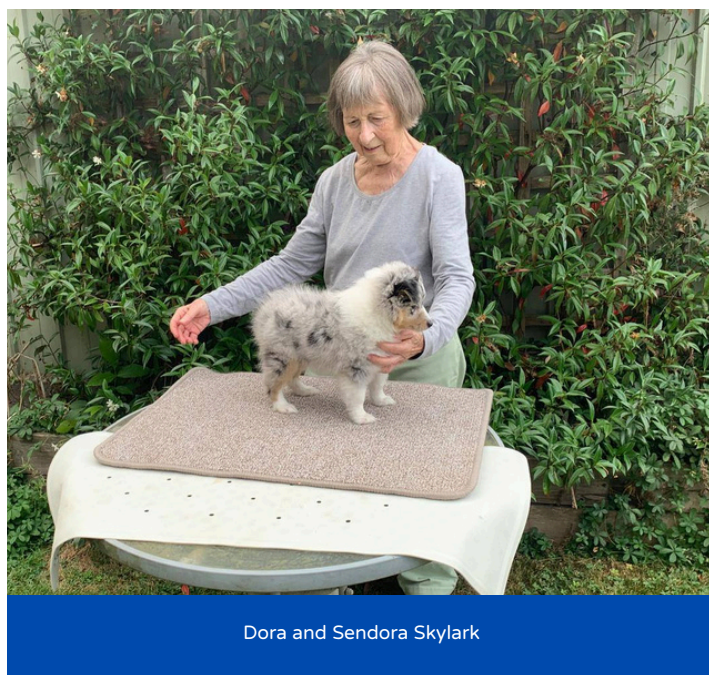


From Crunchie came seven generations, including Tiffin, Malteser, Minty, Caramel, Flake, and finally Whispa. Although mated with Shelties, this line were not registered as Shelties.

Dora bred with warmth and instinct rather than ambition, enjoying the process and the dogs themselves as much as any success in the ring. Above all, her Shelties were companions and family, each valued for their character, quirks, and place in her life, not simply for what they might achieve. Although a CC eluded Dora, her puppies had a good deal of success in the show ring.

She was deeply knowledgeable about the breed and generous in sharing that knowledge, introducing many friends to dog shows and the wider Sheltie community. Her dogs reflected her own nature: spirited, gentle, resilient, and full of heart.

In her final days, Dora remained devoted to her Shelties. Her last puppy, Shrimpy, was a tiny but determined fighter whose brief life perfectly reflected Dora's lifelong commitment to care and kindness. Shrimpy's sudden passing was followed by Dora's own the next day, leaving many with the feeling that they were simply meant to stay together. So they did, and Shrimpy's ashes were placed in her favourite toy in Dora's arms and they were laid to rest together.

Shrimpy's sister survives as Sendora Skylark, and is shown by Susie Symons. Happily, Skylark has just qualified for Crufts at the recent Manchester show. Dora would be delighted. Dora will be remembered within the Shetland Sheepdog community not only for her dogs, but for her humour, generosity, and the quiet joy she took in sharing her life with them.

## Moving on up! Jo & Midna win into Grade 2



I began training my little tri-colour Midna (Hillhenry Midnight Memory) in 2024. I had previously competed in Grade 1 with my first Sheltie, Womble (Francehill Wonderboy) who had been from what became Margaret Norman's final litter, but had grown too big for show. Midna's breeder, Donna Linford, had identified Midna's early talent for zooming around and was looking for an agility home for her.

Midna took to all kinds of training with great enthusiasm. Her agility foundations were no exception and she clearly absolutely loves it. Unfortunately for me, she is very fast, so I often find

myself behind her and have had to learn a whole new way of handling compared to Womble, who was always by my side. Of course it is possible I was just faster back then, as it was over a decade earlier!

Midna quickly gained some wins in Jumping classes, but the Agility win eluded us both. In order to progress to the next grade, you need a certain number of wins, and of these, a set number must be Agility classes. These need to be 'clear rounds' i.e. with no mistakes. After an enforced break for maternity leave (mine!) we returned to the show ring at Elystari in September last year. Midna got a first in the Agility class and won into Grade 2 after only a couple of training sessions following nearly a year's break. I was delighted with her.

Having the help of more experienced handlers has been instrumental in our progress. Julia Carr, a fellow branch member (and fellow Hillhenry owner) has been extremely kind, encouraging and generous with her experience, having taken her own Shelties to Grade 7, the top grade. She even filmed runs for us in the rain to help us learn, so a big thankyou to goes out to her.

There are a few budding agility dogs in the Branch now which is great to see. Shelties love to work and make great agility dogs! If you've ever been curious to try the sport, do give it a go. 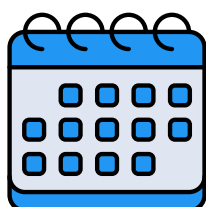

## Midna's Liver Cake Recipe

### INGREDIENTS:

- 250g liver (any kind, Midna likes lamb)
- 3 tbsp plain flour
- 1 handful porridge oats
- 1 large egg
- 0.5 tsp crushed garlic (optional)

### METHOD :

- Preheat oven to 190°C/170°C fan. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper
- Mince the liver with a chopper or food processor until smooth, or slightly chunky if your dog prefers that texture
- Whisk egg, add to liver and mix together
- Add flour, oats (chopped up smaller with the food processor or chopper beforehand if desired) and garlic
- Mix together and tip onto baking tray. Spread evenly with spatula to approx 5mm thickness
- Bake for 30-35 minutes until cooked through and no pink remains inside. Transfer and let cool on a wire rack until just warm. Chop into small pieces using a sharp knife
- Store a small amount in an airtight container in the fridge and freeze the rest. Take out a handful prior to training, it will defrost in your treat bag
