Good citizen dog scheme can take you to Crufts!

The Good Citizen Dog Training Scheme is the largest dog training program in the UK, established by The Kennel Club in 1992. It's designed to promote responsible dog ownership and help owners train their dogs for everyday life situations. The scheme is open to all dogs, regardless of age, breed, or whether they are registered with The Kennel Club

There are four award levels in the scheme:

- **1.Puppy Foundation**
- 2. Bronze
- 3. Silver
- 4.Gold

Each level focuses on different aspects of training and behaviour, progressively building on the skills learned in the previous level. The program is non-competitive

and emphasizes achievement, making it accessible to dog owners of all fitness levels and abilities.

Now this is where it changes to competition if you would like to enter the Crufts good citizen classes. Practice at some open shows and go with your breeder or others from the Branch to that show. To qualify for Crufts you will need to then go to a Champ show.

The dog that you are competing with needs to have achieved Bronze or above. Merlot has gold, Onyx silver! The dogs must be KC registered and then you need to get them qualified in the normal way to enter Crufts; so for instance Merlot got a 2nd at the Birmingham Championship National dog show in 2024. Onyx won 1st Junior at Windsor championship show in 2024. There are also ways of qualifying for life such as achieving a stud book number. The club has done well at Crufts in all classes but especially Good Citizen, Merlot got a 2nd in Good Citizen dog and Spice, with Dot Weller won 1st Good Citizen Bitch.

Congratulations to all that have got their good citizen awards! Keep practicing and you can get to GOLD!!







Tick season is here!



Thanks to the mild weather earlier in the season, ticks are out in force in our area! Ticks are common parasites affecting dogs in the UK, especially in grassy, wooded, or bushy areas such as the New Forest, Exmoor, and the Lake District. The most prevalent species are Ixodes ricinus (sheep or deer tick) and Ixodes hexagonus (hedgehog tick). Ticks feed on dogs' blood and can transmit diseases like Lyme disease, which causes symptoms such as lameness, fever, and swollen joints, and in rare cases, severe illness including kidney damage. Remove ticks with a tick removal tool, avoiding squeezing the body or leaving the head in. Don't burn, smother or pull the tick.



Talking Dogs Rally

In April I organised a Talking Dogs Rally training day attended by several of our members. We were lucky enough to have Sue Coulstock and Lynn Fagg as our trainers for the day. The day went really well and we all learnt a lot. Most of us were complete beginners so we were all in it together.

So what is Talking Dogs Rally?

"Talking Dogs Rally® is the only canine rally organisation in the UK specifically devised for pet dogs and their people with a core value of allowing natural not stylised movement and maintaining balance throughout the courses where dogs work on both the left and right sides. We were the first to colour code the signs to clearly show what level of difficulty teams can expect and we were also the first to print



full descriptions of how to perform each exercise on the back of the station signs" This quote is from the Talking Dogs website https://talkingdogsrally.co.uk

As someone new to this activity I can tell you it is a lot of fun and a great way to enjoy time with your dog. There are a series of exercises to learn and these are all put together as a course with around 12 "stations" or exercises. Some are as simple as "right turn" or "sit" with slightly more interesting exercises such as slalom. You move at your own speed from one exercise to the next and a complete round takes just a minute or two to complete. The emphasis is on fun and connection. Unlike more serious obedience competitions the style is relaxed natural.

I recently took part in my first trial and found it warm and friendly. You are not really competing with the other teams you are aiming to gain qualifications with your dog so you are only competing with yourself. This meant the atmosphere was light and supportive. Both Taz and Vixen did really well earning two "Ace" rosettes. Lois Dowling and Bree also entered and also "Aced" it with two rosettes. Bree got the best score of the day in our trio.
